

AN INTERVIEW WITH ANTON LESSER, ACTOR

Anton Lesser lives in Tysoe. He is a versatile actor who has appeared on stage, film, TV and radio. He is known in particular for his roles in *Game of Thrones*, *Wolf Hall* and *Endeavour*.

While 'resting' he greatly enjoys gardening and walking. Shirley talked to him about his role in *Endeavour*, which was shown on ITV in February, the final series.



How long have you played the role of Chief Superintendent Bright?

Series VII was the last one, so that means seven years as it's been one a year.

How has your character developed over that time?

Bright started as the thorn in Endeavour's side. He's very strict, ex-Indian Military Police, who does everything right-by-the-book, a no-nonsense sort of character. At least that's where we began. Over the years we've come to see a bit more of him out-of-uniform. There was one flash-back when he saved the life of a friend in India and in another we got to meet his wife. I think the audience loves that.

So how does the chemistry of *Endeavour* work?

Really, it's a threesome: there's the avuncular, older detective, *Thursday* played by Roger Allam, there's the young *Morse*, played by Sean Evans, and there's the old-school *Chief Superintendent*. Gradually it's become more about their relationship, not only to the plot and the crimes they solve, but to each other and how they rub off against one another, so you've seen them grow as human beings.

Do you have a laugh with the rest of the cast?

I'm afraid it's mainly 'corpsing.' We've been together seven years. Every year when we reconvene for the read-through it's like being with family. We all love each other and take the mickey out of one another. Yeah, it's lovely and I feel very sad now that it's finished.

BIG BIRD WATCH 2020

A fantastic total of 57 adults and 7 children from 41 households took part in Tysoe's RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch between 25 - 27 January. In addition, 48 children from Tysoe School did their own counts. All of the results have been summarised and the recording sheets sent to the RSPB for the national count. The RSPB asked us to count the maximum number of birds that landed at any one time in our gardens, to avoid counting the same bird twice.



Tysoe No 6 = Robin

The results of the Tysoe residents' count are summarised in the chart on the right. The House Sparrow was the most abundant bird followed closely by the Blue Tit. The RSPB results for England in 2019 are shown for comparison showing the House Sparrow also took the top spot. In fact, House Sparrows have come in first place in the Big Garden Birdwatch for 16 years in succession but they are seen in much smaller numbers than when the Birdwatch started in 1979 - with a 56% decline. Fortunately, this trend has slowed in the past 10 years.

Last year's RSPB Big Birdwatch also highlighted the decline in numbers of Song Thrushes and Starlings, which have declined by around 77%. It is thought the decline in Song Thrushes is down to loss of habitats where they like to live and breed. In contrast, there was good news in 2019 for some of the smaller species. The numbers of Coal Tits were up by nearly 245% since 1979, and Goldfinches have increased by around 70% since the early 2000s. The results for the 2020 RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch should be out soon on the RSPB web site https://www.rspb.org.uk/.




Tysoe No 1 = House Sparrow

The schoolchildren's records covered a wider area as a good number of them live outside Tysoe. Their top bird species was the Wood Pigeon, closely followed by the Blackbird, House Sparrow and Starling.

Tysoe residents also provided details of the other birds and animals that they have seen in their garden during the last year. This has helped us to start a list of species for Tysoe and we can add to that during the year. It includes 47 species of bird. Of the birds not on the RSPB list, woodpeckers (Great Spotted and Green) were seen quite often, as were Jackdaws. Birds of prey included the Buzzard, Sparrowhawk and Red Kite.

Unsurprisingly the Grey Squirrel is the most frequent furry visitor to our gardens – by far! Sadly only 3 households have seen hedgehogs in their gardens in the last year.





PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

The Parish Council held an Ordinary Meeting on 3 February at 7.15pm.

- 1. Councillors (Cllrs) were given an overview of *The Making of Tysoe* project by John Hunter, to be launched on 14 March 2020 at Tysoe Village Hall. A £1600 grant had previously been set aside by the Parish Council for the project. Cllrs asked Mr Hunter to provide a breakdown of costs to discussed at the next meeting. Mr Hunter was also encouraged to speak to the PTA to discuss how the school can become involved.
- 2. Councillors received and noted 2 items of correspondence both relating to parking in the village. One was a request to remove the stones used to keep car drivers off the grass on School Lane and one raised concern over the parking on the grass on Park Row, Main Street. A member of the public also raised concern over threatening behaviour by a neighbour. Cllrs recommended reporting this to the Police. Parking restrictions will be investigated in both locations.
- 3. Cllr Roache, Chair of the Neighbourhood Planning Committee requested access to legal advice on how best to respond to the Examiners report. The request was approved.
- 4. Several planning applications were discussed and are available to view at apps.stratford.gov.uk.
- 5. Playground favourable inspection report received from RoSPA. Gateway to playground has become waterlogged and muddy. Proposal: to improve the area agreed.
- 6. Trees 3 Green Beech and 2 Hornbeam have been sourced and will be planted by Michael Mann on the Playing Fields. Thomas Fox has been contracted to remove all deadwood from the Oak tree near the bench across from the village hall.
- 7. Playing Fields Michael Mann Farmers have been awarded the mowing contract for the playing fields for 2020/21.
- 8. Tennis Club lease has been agreed for 25 years.
- 9. Footpaths a member of the public has written to Stratford DC regarding reinstatement of a footpath. SDC have refused. Cllr Millward will write to SDC and WCC supporting reinstatement. All to advise Cllr Millward of any other footpaths to include in the letter.
- 10.Street Lighting quote accepted regarding street lighting repair on Main Street and Back Lane.



WOT2Grow COMMUNITY ORCHARD

January saw the annual Wassail event at the orchard where around sixty people, including lots of children, gathered to take part in this ancient ceremony to encourage good crops for the coming year. A lot of noise was made by banging pans etc, gun shot rang



out and the torchlight procession went through the orchard to the Wassail tree where they sang and threw cider over the tree and ground! Pancakes courtesy of the scouts, hot drinks and mulled cider and apple juice warmed people as they gathered round the big bonfire.

Despite the high winds and heavy rain work at the orchard has continued with volunteers putting in hours of effort! The autumn raspberries are cut back to the ground ready for the new canes to emerge for this summer's fruit. The blackcurrants are pruned and fed and the old gooseberries which were not doing well have been removed! The blueberry beds have been weeded and the pruning started. The wind break hedges are still being cut back and need to be completed by March as that is the beginning of the bird nesting season and we can't disturb them.

We make our own liquid feeds so the essential comfrey bed has been weeded so the plants are ready to start vigorous growth that we can harvest for steeping in water!
