News from St. Mary's - 21st March 2020

Church is changing, but it is not closed.



This Sunday is Mothering Sunday, a day when we remember our mothers, fathers, stepmothers and carers to name but a few of the special people we want to show we care about.

This year we will not be able to get together in church and because of health restrictions you may not be able to meet together as families.

We cannot meet in our churches as services and gatherings cannot go ahead but we will still bundle up bunches of daffodils for you to collect for someone important to you. Normally these would be given out but as we are not able to distribute them ourselves, we would hope you will come and take a bunch yourselves.

This Mothering Sunday, the Archbishop of Canterbury will lead a national broadcast on BBC Radio 4's Sunday Worship and 39 local BBC radio stations. The service will include prayers, hymns and a short sermon. The service will be broadcast on BBC Radio 4's Sunday Worship at 08.10 am and all local radio stations in England at 8:00.

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are calling all churches to a National Day of Prayer. At 7:00 pm on Sunday, we are asked to light a candle in the windows of our homes as a visible symbol of the light of life, Jesus Christ, our source and hope in prayer, the light that cannot be extinguished. I will be doing so and also lighting a candle in the church whilst praying for all those vulnerable people.

As you light your candle, please pray for all in leadership at this time, for those working in health and social care, and especially for the most vulnerable, whether elderly or those with underlying health conditions. I will light a candle at this time every day and you may wish to join me at that time when I shall be saying the service of late evening prayer. On a more practical note the Foodbanks that we as a church have been supporting for over two years are really struggling to meet the increased demand from those in greatest need. There is a box available at the back of Church for any donations to the Food Bank, we are supporting through our churches those in Shipston and Coventry. They especially need:

Tinned meat/fish, cooking sauces, tinned tomatoes, beans, vegetables dried (not fresh) pasta & rice, UHT milk, Coffee, Custard, Fruit, Milk, Puddings, Rice Pudding, Soup tins & packet, Sugar, Shower Gel, Toothbrushes, Toothpaste & Anti-perspirant, nappies, sanitary products, soap, soap powder, toilet rolls the list goes on but these are the primary items.

If you could possibly help by purchasing just one extra item each week on top of your usual shopping this would really help families which are much less fortunate than ourselves. We have been asked that all food items have use by or best before by dates which have as long a shelf life as possible. **Many thanks for your kind support.**
